# The Killbuck Valley Railroad - Installment 2 of 3 Preparing the Shelves and Laying the Scenery Base

s mentioned in the first installment, each section of my Killbuck Valley Railroad is built on a 24" x 8" wooden shelf that can be wall-mounted

with two screws. These shelves come unstained and are roughly three inches thick. For each of the four sections, the same procedure was used to ensure a uniform position of the track and the amount of space available for scenery and terrain variations.

The four sections include the Overton depot scene, the fall tree line, the abandoned tipple siding, and the flag stop



station of Poor, which also serves as a makeshift coaling stop for locomotives. Each section can be interchanged to create a variety of different orders or configurations of the

> layout and the scenery treatment and colors are consistent throughout.

The following photos and captions will describe the techniques used in each phase of the project.

(left) The Killbuck Valley Railroad passes through the 'fall tree line' section of Matt Woods' shelf layout. Three other 24" x 8" sections make up this highly detailed narrow gauge railroad.



For each shelf, a ½ black foam core base was glued on using Tacky Glue. This provides a uniform foundation for laying the track and securing subsequent scenic layers such as styrofoam and Das Air Dry Clay. The track is a unique product from Custom Trax. The track is pre-made, handlaid track on wooden ties and a foam roadbed. It comes pre-ballasted, although for this project, it was re-ballasted. The foam roadbed was secured with Tacky Glue approximately 2" from the front edge of the shelf.



On each of the four layout sections, the terrain is different. Two of them have fairly extensive stratified rock carved from styrofoam and positioned along the back edge of the shelf secured with Tacky Glue. Carving foam to mimic stratified shale or sandstone with coal seams is not as difficult as you might think. It does require some practice and using reference photos can be helpful. The foam carving can be started before securing the pieces to the shelf, but additional shaping and sculpting can be done once it is glued in place. Start by cutting a series of parallel, horizontal lines using an Exacto knife and chip away chunks until a satisfying rock appearance is achieved. On the two sections with the rock formations, I used green extruded polystyrene foam on one of them and 1/2" black foam core with the paper backing removed on the other. These foams are two different densities and textures, but both proved to be usable for this application. The blending of the foam layers and enhancing the terrain profile comes in the next step.



Historically, (left and middle left) I have used *Sculptamold* for blending foam layers and creating variations in surface topography, but in recent years, have switched to *DAS* brand air dry clay. I find the clay easier to contour and shape, along with a shorter drying time. The clay retains texture better and allows small areas to be shaped more easily. Once the clay has been positioned and smoothed with wet fingers, it can be textured by stippling with a cut off china bristle brush over the surface. This imparts a good granular type appearance that will resemble earth once painted. The drying time of the air dry clay is around 24 hours for complete hardness. It is best to work in fairly thin layers. Once all the clay has thoroughly dried, a coating of inexpensive raw umber craft paint can be applied to everything but the track. This provides a good dark earth tone base for subsequent scenery layers.



I did not follow (above right) the exact same procedure on all of the shelf sections as far as adding dirt or grit texture to the painted clay. On the final section I added texture on top of the clay base. Historically, model railroaders have relied on the colors of the materials they choose to achieve the final scenery coloration. In the military modeling realm, dissimilar colored textures are used and unified through painting and colored washes. On the fourth section,



I took this approach and found it to be very successful. The depth and scale of color can be varied more easily using paint and a more realistic appearance can be achieved. I have used the traditional approach on many projects, but am convinced this military modeling technique is superior and more versatile. As previously mentioned, I started by stippling a dilute base of raw umber craft paint and worked in various other earth shades using different dilutions. In nature, the ground is not one uniform color and this variation can easily be achieved with acrylic paints.


Once the scenic foundation (right) has been painted with the base layer of raw umber and some tonal variation has been imparted with either washes or stippling of other earth tones, the rock work can be painted. The carved foam rock work should start with the same base coat of raw umber as the rest of the groundwork. It is critical that all the nooks and crannies of the stratified foam receive the base coat and no foam is showing through. From there, various tans and light gray can be stippled and dry brushed onto the rock face. The cracks and crevices will retain the darker raw umber color while the rock faces are lightened with the tan and/ or gray. There is no exact procedure for getting the rock to look right. Referring to photos and adding other rust colored tones will achieve more realism. Once a satisfactory rock coloration is laid down, a wash of diluted black acrylic paint can be brushed over the rock surfaces. Once



this is thoroughly dry, a drybrushing of light tan or gray can be done over the hard edges of the rock. If a coal seam is desired, go in using a dark gray black and paint one of the stratified layers, particularly under an overhang to represent a vein of coal. Shale rock comes in many different earth tones, depending on lighting and degree of moisture. Experiment with a range of colors. This is a very forgiving technique and you can always start over by repainting the foam with a raw umber base.

As mentioned in the first photo caption, the Custom Trax product is pre-ballasted. The sections I used are On30 Code 70 with Woodland Scenics cinder ballast. I have recently gravitated to obtaining my ballast from various accumulated cinders, dirt, and small rocks that you find in parking lots or near storm drains. This material, when sifted, has a very realistic varied tone that cannot be matched with any commercial product. It is also very fine and simulates steam era weathered ballast and cinders very well. On three of the four sections, I used this approach and have done so on other projects. It is free and can be found in many locations. The traditional approach of spreading the ballast using a soft brush followed by a light misting of isopropyl alcohol and diluted matte medium was used. To further enhance the appearance of the track, I extensively used Pan Pastels which are similar to weathering powders. They come in a cake form and contain an adhesive. By using a soft brush, a variety of earth tones were applied to the rail and dry ballast to give a more realistic appearance.




