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What Makes a Great Model Railroad

very year, "Model Railroader" magazine publishes a special edition entitled "Great Model Railroads."

Typically, they will have features on 10 or 12 lay-

outs in a variety of scales and gauges, along with different eras and regions of the country. Throughout the years, many of the well-known private and club layouts have appeared in this special publication and been recognized as great model railroads.

This begs the question(s) of "What is a great model railroad?" and "How do we potentially achieve that level of quality and acclaim for



our own layouts?" Although the notion of a great model railroad is highly subjective and is somewhat in the eye of the beholder, I would like to present a few characteristics

that I believe will enhance the quality of our layouts and help us come closer to our own vision of building a great model railroad.

1. Pursue something you can actually finish.

Many modelers take on a design or ambition for their layout that they will likely never complete. Think in terms of a more manageable size and a five to ten year timetable. You can always build another layout once this manageable project is completed or even expand the original project.

2. Shoot for a high scenery to track ratio.

Many modelers incorporate too much trackwork into their layouts and approach scenery as an after-thought. Prioritize scenery and plan for it from the beginning. A great layout is one in which the trains travel through expansive scenery. The railroad should look like it was built through the scenery, not as though the scenery was built around the track.

3. Choose a prototype, or portion of a prototype, that can be scaled down to a reasonable sized layout. Nobody can model the entire Pennsylvania Railroad or the Santa Fe. Think in terms of a small segment or branchline of your favorite prototype or one particular yard, junction, or town. For many, narrowing down the scope of what they are modeling will be difficult, but by focusing on a few signature scenes and industries, a much higher level of realism can be achieved and the project is not overwhelming. There are many interesting branch lines or industrial railroads that have unique, modelgenic features and can fit into a reasonable space.

4. Choose something different.

There are an infinite number of railroads going back to the mid-1800's. Pick a prototype or a proto-free-lanced subject that no one else is doing. The more obscure and esoteric, the better. If you want to have a freelanced railroad, come up with your own set of standards and characteristics that are unique and will define your railroad.


5. Build and complete small sections at a time.

Don't build a basement full of benchwork that will take another three years to complete the trackwork, followed by another two years for wiring, and so on. Build modular sections that can be integrated together, moving on to each phase and skill set before beginning another section. At the very least, complete scenery on sections of your layout to enhance motivation and sense of achievement.

Don't be afraid to ask for help on skills you may not currently possess or like.

If wiring is not your thing and it is bogging you down and preventing progress, consider asking a friend for help or

paying someone to do it. This would be true of any skills, whether it's benchwork, trackwork, scenery, or building structures. Everyone has their favorite part of the hobby. There is no shame in farming certain skills out.



The more emotionally connected you are to a specific time and place, the better your modeling will be. It is very difficult to do good modeling if there is no emotional connection. The railroad you grew up around or you visited on vacation or a book that caught your imagination will yield a more invested approach.

8. Practice techniques and skills away from your main layout before transferring them to your main project.

Don't try to build elaborate scenery without some practice. Making smaller modules or dioramas will allow you to develop the necessary skills before you attempt the big project. If you are not confident that you can execute something well, then don't attempt it until you're ready.

9. Maintain continuity throughout the layout.

Choose colors for scenery materials that will be consistent and easily replicated in the future. Fortunately, Woodland Scenics has been around for many years and maintained consistent colors. There are other companies that have done the same, but don't use materials that you will have a very difficult time finding in the future. Come up with a consistent color palette that is unified throughout the layout.

10. Study the prototype.

The Morning Sun books are an invaluable resource

for modelers. Do your research before you dive into starting a layout. Consider the pros and cons of various localities or prototypes. Find one or a geographical area that supplies your vision for a layout, then find other supporting resources. This can be a hobby in and of itself and adds to the diversity and depth of model railroading.

11. Take photographs as you progress and use them to check your work.

A great model railroad stands up to the scrutiny of photography. Build your layout with photography in mind. Today's smartphones take excellent model pictures and can be used as part of the in-process activities.

12. Think quality over quantity.

Focus on completing portions of your layout to a high standard instead of having an insurmountable project hanging over your head. Although they always say a model railroad is never finished, finishing a layout or large module allows you to move on to other subject matter and improve upon your previous effort. Don't make your layout an albatross that will sit in your basement overwhelming you. Design a layout that gives you satisfaction, but also keeps you motivated and committed.

13. It is useful to have a number of appropriate and interesting structures built ahead of time to utilize in planning and design.

By having some stations, industries, small stores, water towers, etc. built as track planning and scenery design are occurring, you can try out different arrangements and positions. It also provides a diversion from other layout activities. Cardboard mock ups can also be used and built to a fairly high standard to use as stand ins until better versions can be finished.

14. Share your work with other people as you progress, either through social media or other railroad specific outlets.

Feedback and encouragement should be part of the process.

15. Aspire to greatness and believe in your abilities.

Although this is a hobby and supposed to be fun, don't be afraid to think big. Everyone wants a layout or modeling that they are proud of and get positive feedback for. Look at each aspect of your layout as a reflection of your skills and abilities and try to do your best on everything.

N-Scale Report

Concerning March Module report. Note DIVISION 1 has two module groups, HO and N which is often forgotten. While there are differences in scale we have some of the same problems. Some differences may help to resolve HO issues.

- Due to Covid, we lost two members and we always needed another member or two. Need more members.
- All N Modules are owned by Group's Member and are usually kept in good shape or prepped before a show if it is to be used by owner.
- Since following NTRAK concepts of a pit surrounded by modules yard tracks usually off main line and can be used for display and connection time is generally not an issue to running train.
- We can get trains running in 4 hours since the three main lines match up per NRail standards.
 By dropping modules we have setup at a nursing home with two people in two hours.
- Scenery is always last or held at a minimum like was done at nursing home.
- Height is usually biggest issue in module alignment. Having lots of shims of varying thickness and good torpedo levels are always needed. Shows at Salem or the Stark County Fair require extra time which cannot be shorted due to the uneven floors.
- End to end alignment can be enhanced by matching lining up painted arrowheads and in some cases pins and sleeves are used or modules are bolted together. We have added thin aluminum plates to inside module ends and then modules are aligned, clamped and drilled. The plates lessen wear with use of pins or bolts.
- Better rail joiner? In N scale we used Kato expansion tracks, but they are not available in HO. As an alternative, space equal to one half the length of a piece sectional track is made available at the end of each track of adjoining modules. Then an actual piece of sectional track where rail joiners which can be slid back and forth is placed in space between tracks on modules. Then using a slotted screw driver rail joiners are pushed into place. Sectional track use in this way should be prepped before first use and store for next setup. It may be necessary to remove or rework a tie at the ends of sectional track used to aid joiner installation.
- The only way to readily reduce the weight of existing Modules is to drill holes or cut ovals out of existing structure while maintaining acceptable strength. Attempt to obtain original designer's assistance. Note N-scale modules design is not as rugged and are lighter. Some of these have been in service since 1975. In Florida an N-scale

- module group has went to light weight aluminum angle frames with plywood tops for strength and to escape moisture expansion and contraction.
- HO T-TRAK, probably not an answer. It is not impossible but it is a different base structure. Needs a lot of up front thinking and design to save what you have. One N module member has full set NTRAK modules. Three members have Modules in some state of completion. One of those modules hopefully will be dual NTRAK/T-TRAK.
- Electrical or electronics is usually where we have had problem, mostly due to bad crimps on connector plugs. Hopefully we have found them all. Also we found that installing new batteries after long term storage is a good practice.
- Clean track, especially switch points and frogs before show or putting modules in place saves time.
- Finally, get more members!!!


